



Mail-In Absentee Ballot Voting Eligibility

Kentucky law allows mailing an absentee ballot to voters who meet the following criteria:

- 1 Person who due to age, disability, or illness will be unable to go to the polls on Election Day.
- 2 Student who temporarily resides outside the county in which he/she is registered.
- 3 Voter who temporarily resides outside the state but is still eligible to vote in this state.
- 4 Person incarcerated in jail who has been charged with a crime but has yet to be convicted of the crime.
- 5 Person whose employment requires him/her to be absent from the county all hours and all days absentee voting by machine is conducted.
- 6 Military personnel confined to a military base on Election Day.
- 7 Residents of Kentucky and their dependents who are members of the Armed Forces.
- 8 Kentucky citizens residing overseas.

Only the voter or the voter's spouse, parent or child can request an application for a mail-in absentee ballot.

No absentee ballot shall be mailed to a voter's Jefferson County address except to those voters who qualify for reasons listed in numbers 1 and 5.

The last day that the Election Center can accept a completed Mail-In Absentee Ballot application is by close of business, seven (7) days before the Election.

Absentee ballots applications may be requested in person, by mail, fax, phone or e-mail. Absentee ballot applications are also available at any Jefferson County Clerk's Motor Vehicle Office. To apply for an absentee mail-in ballot click here
